

OF STATE RESPECTING THE CONDITION OF ISRAELITES IN.

An extensive collection of correspondence and discussions regarding the status and persecution of the Jews of Russia and the attempts by American Government Officials to intervene in specific cases of persecution of the Jews. President Arthur's support for the Jews of Russia, was even related to the founding of the Red Cross. As Denis Brian notes in "The Elected and the Chosen: Why American Presidents Have Supported Jews and Israel" (Jerusalem, 2012) "on May 2,



1882, President Arthur sent this special message to Congress: 'In answer to the resolution of the House of Representatives...calling for correspondence respecting the condition of Israeites in Russia' [ie. this publication]....Soon after, Arthur had a new secretary of state, Frederick Frelinghuysen, who stepped up the diplomatic pressure on Russia. He wrote to the American representative there, 'The prejudice of race and creed have in our days given way to the claims of our common humanity. The people of the United States have heard with great respect the suffering of the Jewish Russians....It can scarcely be doubted that much has been done which a humane person must

condemn....' Mean while, in America, a group of volunteers led by Cara Barton met in the Washington, DC, home of Adolphus Solomon, a Jewish American printer and philanthropist with special concern for Russian Jews....In Solomon's home the group drew up the constitution for a new organization called the American Red Cross. They elected Barton president, and Solomon vice president, a position he held for seven years. When in 1884 President Arthur was asked to appoint the first American delegates to the International Congress of the Red Cross in Geneva, he chose Barton and Solomon....Adolpus Solomon also helped to create the American Jewish Historical Society" (pp. 133-134). 

The committee was tasked to examine





Phillips (1811-1884) was a Jewish Representative from Pennsylvania born in Philadelphia. He attended the Philadelphia schools and Franklin Institute; studied law; was admitted to the bar in 1832 and commenced practice in Philadelphia; clerk of the court of common pleas of Philadelphia; elected as a Democrat to the Thirty-fifth Congress (March 4,

1857-March 3, 1859). He was an unsuccessful in his re-election reelection bid in 1858 and resumed the practice of law in Philadelphia. He became a trustee of Jefferson Medical College in 1862; was a member of the Board of City Trusts in 1869, vice president of the board 1870-1878, and president 1878-1882; director of the Academy of Music in 1870 and its president in 1872, resigning in 1884; member of the commission to supervise the erection of the municipal buildings in Philadelphia in 1870, resigning in 1871; director of the Pennsylvania Railroad Co. In 1874. "In 1854, Senator Stephen Douglas of Illinois proposed a bill to organize the Territory of Nebraska, a vast area of land that would become Kansas, Nebraska, Montana and the Dakotas. Known as the Kansas-Nebraska Act, the controversial bill raised the possibility that slavery could be extended into territories where it had once been banned. 

A full program for the dedication of a large stain glass window to former Secretary of State John Hay. John Milton Hay (1838–1905) was a U.S. statesman who supported Romanian and Russian Jewish rights. Hay was a secretary of state under presidents William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt from 1898 until his death in 1905. He was involved in U.S. diplomatic representations during this period on behalf of Romanian and Russian Jews. In 1902, at the urging of American Jewish leaders including Oscar S. Straus and Jacob H. Schiff, Hay addressed a note to the signatories of the Berlin Treaty of 1878 protesting Romania's violation of that treaty by its restrictions on Jews. Following the Kishinev pogrom of 1903, again after Jewish pressure and with an eye to domestic political considerations, Hay publicized a protest petition drawn up by B'nai B'rith. Oscar Straus, one of the speakers, was appointed to the Permanent Court of Arbitration at the Hague under President Theodore Roosevelt. He would be reappointed by President Roosevelt in 1908, President Taft in 1912, and President Wilson in 1920. Straus made history in 1906 when he became the

first Jewish cabinet member after being appointed by Roosevelt as Secretary of Commerce and Labor. He also participated at the Paris Peace Conference, advising President Wilson on the interests of European Jewry. Elihu Root, another of the speakers, served as the Secretary of State under President Theodore Roosevelt and as Secretary of War under Roosevelt and President William McKinley. "He is sometimes considered to be the prototype of the 20th century political 'wise man,' advising presidents on a range of foreign and domestic issues....Root was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1912. " Andrew Dickson White, another speaker, "was an American historian and educator, who was the cofounder of Cornell University and served as its first president for nearly two decades....He was later appointed as a US diplomat to Germany and Russia" (Wikipedia, 2018). Published as part of the series "Sunday discourses by Rabbi Joseph Krauskopf" featuring text of addresses from the event. "Presented by Rabbi Krauskopf" noted on front cover in pencil. 

This enabled the newly rising community of German American Jews to conduct services according to their own custom, as opposed to that of the Sephardic rite. Frank went on in later years to issue other volumes for other Holidays, and reflecting the customs of the Polish Jews as well. **OCLC lists only 2 copies of this volume anywhere (Columbia and Yale).** A set (New








Hungarian Revolution of 1848/9. He served as an Orthodox rabbi before earning a Ph. D. From the University of Prague in 1861. In that year he became the rabbi of the Neu-Synagogue in Prague. In 1866 Huebsch was invited to become head of Congregation Ahawath Chesed in New York, where he served for the remainder of his life. His interest in liturgy led him to introduce a moderate reformed ritual and to compose a new prayer book, later adopted by many other congregations, in 1872, and, a year later, as part of the same effort, this hymnal. 

Ha-Emet Ha-`lvriyah also contains (pp. 10-150 annotations that Lewinson did not include in his [Sefer Hayi LeBavot] (Vienna: Bet Harnirlra h. 1872), a critical study of Bahya ibn Paquda's Hovot ha-Levavot based on textual variants.... 






Felsenthal was born in Munchweile, Germany and taught in Jewish schools before settling in the U.S. in 1854. There Felsenthal served a congregation in Madison, Indiana, as officiant and teacher; then in 1858 he moved to Chicago as clerk in a banking house, while also devoting himself to rabbinical and theological study. Deeply influenced by David Einhorn, Felsenthal became one of the first protagonists of Reform Judaism in the Midwest. He was a strong

opponent of slavery and refused to accept a pulpit in Mobile, Alabama. He was a founder and secretary of the Chicago Juedisches Reformverein. A statement


of Reform views which he published in 1859, Kol Kore ba-Midbar: Ueber Juedische Reform, attracted some attention, and when the Reformverein developed into the Sinai Congregation, he became its first rabbi (1861). He was ordained by Einhorn and Samuel Adler. In 1864 Felsenthal became rabbi of the newly formed Zion Congregation, which he headed until his retirement in 1887. When questions on ritual came to him, he generally took an advanced Reform view. In several instances he dissented from the proposals of Isaac M. Wise. Thus, he strongly opposed the establishment of a rabbinical seminary, believing that conditions in America did not provide a satisfactory foundation. On the other hand, he advocated Jewish day schools. In 1879 he declined a professorship at Hebrew Union College. In later years Felsenthal became concerned with the threat to the Jews in America posed by religious indifference, and feeling that the course taken by Reform was preparing a "beautiful death" for Judaism, became an enthusiastic supporter of the Zionist movement. Felsenthal was a founder of the Jewish Publication Society of America and of the American Jewish Historical Society. For more on Felsenthal, see E. 



The first translation into English "was published in 1840 by Mordecai Manuel Noah and A. S. Gould. The translator was not named but was lauded by one of the four Hebraists who commented in the preface. 'To Mssrs Noah and Gould. Gentlemen - I am acquainted with the 'Book of Jasher,' having read a considerable part of it while in the hands of the translator in England. The Hebrew is very purely written, and the translator is an eminent scholar.'—

Rabbi H. V. Nathan, Kingston Synagogue, Jamaica, April 14, 1840. Subsequently, the translator identified himself as Moses Samuel of Liverpool (1795–1860), who had obtained a copy of the 1625 Hebrew edition and become convinced that the core of this work truly was the self-same Book of the Upright referenced in Hebrew scriptures. He translated the document into English and, after the Royal Asiatic Society at Calcutta declined to publish it, sold the translation to New York City publisher Noah for £150 in 1839. Samuel later said of the absence of his name on the translation that "I did not put my

name to it as my Patron [ie M.M.Noah] and myself differed about its authenticity" – Noah having had less confidence in the 1625 document than did Samuel. Even so, Noah enthusiastically claimed in his promotional materials that the historian Josephus had said of the Book of Jasher 'by this book are to be understood certain records kept in some safe place on purpose, giving an account of what happened among the Hebrews from year to year, and called Jasher or the upright, on account of the fidelity of the annals.' No such statement is found in Josephus's works. Noah's 1840 preface contained endorsements by Hebrew scholars of the day, all of whom praised the quality of the



translation, but these said nothing to indicate they believed it to be the work referred to in Joshua and 2 Samuel. In fact one of them, Samuel H. Turner




(1790–1861), of the General Theological Seminary in New York City, commented that 'The work itself is evidently composed in the purest Rabbinical Hebrew, with a large intermixture of the Biblical idiom', indicating he was not of the opinion that it was an ancient text....Joseph Smith, founder of the Latter Day Saint movement, acquired a copy in 1841 or 1842 and wrote in the September 1, 1842 edition of the Times and Seasons, in reference to the patriarch Abraham: 'the book of Jasher, which has not been disproved as a bad author, says he was cast into the fire of the Chaldeans'. In 1886, Joseph Hyrum Parry of Salt Lake City acquired the rights to the translation

from Mordecai Noah's estate. It was published by J. H. Parry & Company in Salt Lake City in 1887. A number of Mormon scholars consider this Book of Jasher to be of authentic ancient Hebrew origin. Some of these scholars suggest that the book likely contains many original portions of the Sefer HaYashar referenced in the Old Testament but also has a number of added interpolations. This Joseph Hyrum Parry edition of the Book of Jasher

continues to be held in high repute by many Mormons. A number of Mormons have pointed to certain portions of the book that have commonalities to parts of the Joseph Smith Translation of the Bible, particularly those parts dealing with the antediluvian period. The Bible has only scant information about pre-flood times, but both the Book of Jasher and parts of the Joseph Smith Translation of the Bible contain additional information, some of which is strikingly similar" (wikipedia). Henry Hanaw of Mobile, Ala., 'Jew Hating and Jew Baiting,' was an eloquent and glowing tribute to our race and received, as it merited, general commendation and approval. The oration by Bro. Charles Frenkel, of Galveston, "I.O.B.B. The Offspring of Judaism," excited much interest, and Bro, Frenkel at once reached a high place in the ranks of the gifted orators of our District" (Vol 17, 1894, p. 404). This work is cited in John Higham's 1957 article, "Anti-Semitism in the Gilded Age: A Reinterpretation" (Mississippi Valley Historical Review Vol. 43, No. 4); Then, interestingly, in his 1987 book "Uneasy at Home: Antisemitism and the American Experience" (Columbia), Leonard Dinnerstein references Higham's citation of Hanaw's work but calls it "an essay I have been unable to obtain" (p. 75). Following his death, Hanaw (1856-1916) was eulogized in The Jewish Ledger as "one of the most prominent and highly respected lawyers of Mobile" (Feb 18, 1916, p. 22), and the Hanaw family remains prominent in Alabama Jewish life. 

(Yerushalmi). Otto (Nathan) Geismar (1873 – 1957) was "an art teacher at the Berlin Jewish Community school (later called 'middle school') for boys from 1904 till 1936. In 1930 the Jewish community granted Geismar a scholarship for a several-month-long stay in Palestine. In 1939 Geismar and his wife emigrated to Brazil and, after the Second World War, they both moved to

England to be closer to their daughter. Geismar's first published work is closely related to his profession: his book Tier-Schnell-Zeichnen was published in Berlin in 1926 as a drawing manual. A year after his Haggadah, in 1928, Geismar's biblical illustrations for children were published as Bilder Bibel by Rubin Mass, again in Berlin (and republished by the same in 1940 in Jerusalem; later in Israel the illustrations accompanied books of children's poetry and rhymes by L. Avishai and by L. Kipnis). Still in Berlin, in the



1930s, Geismar illustrated and designed an edition of the Biblical Book of Esther in scroll form (as read on Purim), which was published by Dr. Herbert Löwenstein in Berlin and Tel-Aviv in 1936, as well as other texts. The Haggadah with Geismar's illustrations was published in Hebrew/Aramaic alone and in two separate bilingual editions with the original text and a translation into German and Dutch.... Geismar's early style has been characterized as 'minimalist' and 'expressionistic'; his Haggadah illustrations are marked by bold typography, radically simplified lines, freedom of treatment of traditional themes (e.g., the illustration for the song Had Gadya) and humour (the wicked son as a mocker who thumbs his nose at the wise one; the Plagues of Egypt; a child overcome by the wine and festivities at the end of the seder banquet, etc.). Geismar's optimistic 'logo' can be seen at the end of the book: a little bird chirping in a tree next to an open cage, with the Hebrew initials Aleph Gimel = Otto Geismar" (see http://www.jewishmuseum.cz/en/apredmet.php? datum=04&rok=10). During 1943 and 1944, the extermination camps were working at a furious rate to kill the hundreds of

thousands of people shipped to them by rail from almost every country within the German sphere of influence, and by the spring of 1944, up to 8,000 people were being gassed every day at Auschwitz (USHMM, 2012). Passover 1944 began on April 8, the day that the roundups of the Jews of Carpatho-Ruthenia and northern Hungary started. On April 14, the last day of the Holiday, László Endre & László Baky (German-installed heads of the Ministry of the Interior) and Eichmann made the official decision to deport all the Jews of Hungary. With ten illustrations; an early 19th century German Orthodox Haggadah originally compiled by Wolf Heidenheim in 1822. Published



for German-Jewish refugees in Switzerland under the auspices of the Swiss Federation of Jewish Communities, founded in 1904 to help protect the general interest of Jews in Switzerland; during the second world war, the Federation helped support the refugee community in Switzerland: "Prior to and during the Second World War, Switzerland gave refuge to about 23,000 Jewish refugees although the government decided that Switzerland would serve only as a country of transit. These Jews were protected during the Holocaust due to Swiss neutrality. The Jewish refugees, however, did not receive the financial

support from the government that non-Jewish refugees received. Many more Jews were prevented from entering, effectively shutting the border." (Jewish Virtual Library; Switzerland). During the Holocaust, as European Jewry was pushed to the brink of annihilation by Nazi Germany, the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee was the main financial benefactor towards Jewish emigration from Europe and rescue attempts of Jews from Nazi-controlled territories. From the outbreak of

World War II through 1944, American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee made it possible for more than 81,000 Jews to emigrate out of Nazi-occupied Europe to safety. JDC also smuggled aid to Jewish prisoners in labor camps and helped finance the Polish Jewish underground in preparations for the 1943 Warsaw Ghetto revolt. One work that has gained some acceptance is 'Ritual of Remembrance,' which he prepared in 1953 as a ritual to be observed at Passover Seders.... 

His career in that position was a colourful one. He attacked the newly formed Liberal Jewish movement (a movement more or less equivalent to U. S. Reform Judaism). His powerful attacks on anti-Semitism included one, in the presence of the Russian ambassador, against Russian discrimination. Lehman on behalf of the former residents of Lodz who now lived in American, and whose immediate goal was to bring relief to their coreligionists in the Jew-Zone [sic]. Just how great their sufferings were, the American Jews had gleaned from a single source: Dos blut ruft tsu nekome (The blood cries out for revenge), a collection of eyewitness accounts of Polish Jewish refugees published in Moscow in 1941" (Roskies, 2013). was only the second monograph published on the atrocities at Majdanek.

Simonov (1915-1979) was a highly decorated poet, novelist, playright, and war correspondent whose works were widely known (Wikipedia, 2018). A Polish-Soviet Special Criminal Court was established in Lublin in August 1944 in order to investigate the Nazi crimes in the Majdanek extermination camp, with Simonov covering the proceedings as the basis for this work. The Majdanek concentration camp was established on Heinrich Himmler's order and operated from October 1, 1941 until it was liberated by the Soviet Army on July 22, 1944. It is known to be the best preserved Nazi concentration camp of the Holocaust, as the Germans did not have enough time to destroy the evidences of their crimes. The Commission for investigating the German crimes was established in August 1944 and soon they published this booklet in several languages. Despite of the importance of this statement it must be mentioned that the Commission made many erroneous assumptions regarding the duration of the camp or number of people killed at Majdanek, probably because they were motivated rather by political and propaganda agenda than by a search for historical facts. The total number of the victims is still controversial, in this report 1.5 million victims of different nationalities were counted, however according to the latest researches there were 79, 000 victims, 59, 000 of whom were Jews. The committee assures the reader that the call for special prayers is made in coordination with the

Rabbis and with the support of the Chicago Jewish community: "Di spetsiele tefitah iz oysgeshtelt gevoren oyf dos forlang fun di shikago anti-nazi komite baym merkaz rabonim un vert geshikht tsu oykh mit der guthaysung fun die shikago kehilah mit der rekamendatsye az di tefilah zol gezont veren far Hazkhrot geshemot in tog fun Shemini Atzeret!" This Yiddish call to prayer and explanation fills the first page, while the middle two pages contain the prayer, and the rear panel notes, in Hebrew, that "The prayer is copied from the genius Hida za'l from his book Avodat HaKedesh. And save them from pasture and famine and captivity and plunder, from all fear and from sorrow, and the species and the zealots will subdue and play...." The result is clearly a religiouslyoriented "Human Rights Against Nazism" request that was also hoping to also win participation from less observant Jews. With it's dual Hebrew-Yiddish text, it's assurances of support from the Rabbis and from the community, its explanation of the prayer, and it's request in Yiddish to "please do not throw this prayer in the trash" the pamphlett is accessible to, and respectful of, both communities. Shemini Azeret is the Jewish Holiday which comes following Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, arriving at the end of Sukkot and the day



More than 150,000 Jews were sent there, including 15,000 children, and held there for months or years, before being sent by rail transports to their deaths at Treblinka and Auschwitz extermination camps in occupied Poland, as well as to smaller camps elsewhere. Less than 150 children survived. Although Terezin was not an extermination camp, about 33,000 died in the ghetto. This was mostly due to the appalling conditions arising out of extreme population density, malnutrition and disease. About 88,000 inhabitants were deported to Auschwitz and other extermination camps. At the end of World War II, there were 17,247 survivors of Terezin (including some who had survived the death camps). Many educated Jews were inmates of Terezin. Unlike other camps,

Terezin's detainees included scholars, philosophers, scientists, visual artists, and musicians of all types, some of whom had achieved international renown, and many of these contributed to the camp's cultural life. The Nazis kept a tight rein on the world's perception of activities within Terezin. Their name, which is Aramaic for "guardians of the City," derives from a passage in the Jerusalem Talmud (Hag. 76: 3) stating that religious scholars are the guardians and defenders of the city. Neturei Karta broke away from Agudat Israel in 1935, when the latter attempted to restrain extremist demands for an independent ultra-Orthodox Jerusalem community completely separate from the rest of the Zionist community. The group first adopted the name Hevrat ha-Hayyim, after Rabbi Joseph Hayyim Sonnenfeld. It aimed at creating "a circle free from the influence of the contemporary spirit and its fallacious opinions, " and a condition of membership was "the education of sons and daughters in the traditional Jewish manner, without any change (girls' schools which teach Hebrew do not provide education in the traditional Jewish manner). " The last phrase alluded to Agudat Israel's Bet Ya'akov girls' schools, where the language of instruction is Hebrew. 
